PART II: TELLING THE SINGAPORE STORY

- The Singapore Combined Church Choir

"Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain." Psalm 127:1

The second part of tonight's programme traces the points of thanksgiving for the many blessings of God upon our nation.

Act 1: Early Beginnings

The influx of many immigrants laid the foundation for a multicultural Singapore: Arabs, Armenians, Baweanese, Bugis, Chinese, English, Gujaratis, Javanese, Jews, Minangs, Parsis, Scots...

Adiemus

Adiemus, by the Welsh composer Karl Jenkins, is a "glossolalia" of sounds that have no linguistic meaning but when put together judiciously creates a beautiful symphony of sound. Adiemus symbolically reflects the seemingly random influx of diverse cultures and languages which shaped Singapore.

European Carols

The influence of the Christian faith increased with the arrival of European traders and travellers like the Portuguese, Dutch and British in the 15th century onwards. The new sounds of European carols and chants were added to the native sounds of Singapura.

Puer Natus Est Nobis is a Gregorian chant and the title in Latin means "a boy is born for us."

Puer natus est nobis, Et filius datus est nobis: Cuius imperium super humerum eius: Et vocabitur nomen eius, magni consilii angelus. Cantate Domino canticum novum: Quia mirabilia fecit. A child is born to us, And a Son is given to us: Whose government is upon His shoulder: And His Name shall be called, the Angel of Great Counsel. Sing ye to the Lord a new song for He has done wonderful things.

Beijai O Menino is a popular traditional Portuguese song.

Act 2 - A Growing City

The establishment of a free port by the British spurred an increased influx of many Asian migrants. Some were Christian leaders and missionaries who pioneered some of the early educational, medical and social work.

Dayong Sampan is a popular Indonesian folk song. "Sampan" is derived from the Chinese term "三板" (sān bǎn), which means "three boards" or "three planks", a reference to Chinese boats by Western travellers in the 17th Century. It later entered Southeast Asian vocabularies. These "sampans" were an iconic presence in our Singapore River. "Dayong" means "to row" and this song captures the sense of migrants arriving through the waters to the banks of the river.

Act 3 - The War Years

Singapore was not immune to the turbulence of the world wars and economic depression of the first half of the 20th century. Finally, bombs fell on our city on the 8th of December 1941.

When the bombings started, the injured were carried into the Cathedral, turning the Nave into a hospital ward. On 15th of February 1942, just after the British surrendered, Bishop Leonard Wilson held an evensong service to give thanks for the end of the war. However, it was the beginning of Japanese occupation. Not knowing then what the future would hold, those at this solemn service entrusted their future into God's hands. The hymn, Praise my Soul the King of Heaven was sung.

The Bishop was questioned a few years later, as to the apparent contradiction of the words of the hymn in the midst of war realities: "Father-like he tends and spares us...In his hands he gently bears us... How can that be true?", the Bishop was asked. He replied, "It means that God cares for us whatever our situation we may be in, His inward peace... courage...this is what we prayed for. That we will come through with honour." He never knew then, as we do today, how God's grace has brought us through those war years.

Praise My Soul The King Of Heaven

Act 4 Post-War Years: Growth and Independence

Post war, independence from the British and finally, separation from Malaya created a deep sense of uncertainty. Faced with a diversity in culture, language, race and religion, the peaceful and rapid growth of Singapore into a confident nation caught everyone by surprise.

Mountain Climb - This Mandarin song by Matthew Leong expresses the uncertainties when Singapore was yet faced with another major uncertainty after separation from Malaya. It was an uphill climb...

The Choir of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge Directed by Dr David Skinner Hugh Rowlands & Jack Wilson, Organ Scholars

It is thought that a dedicated chapel choir at Sidney Sussex must have existed in some form since the foundation of the College on Valentine's Day 1596. Since the admission of women to the college in 1976, the Choir of Sidney Sussex has blossomed into one of the most esteemed choral groups in Oxbridge. In 2009, the American composer Eric Whitacre was appointed as Sidney Sussex's first Composer in Residence; in 2015, that mantle was assumed by British composer and Choir alumnus, Joanna Marsh.

The Choir regularly performs at home and abroad, directed by Dr David Skinner, Fellow and Osborn Director of Music at Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge, and artistic director of the early music ensemble Alamire (www.alamire.co.uk). Recent overseas engagements for the Choir have included tours to the USA, Dubai, Jordan, the Italian Riviera and Spain.

The Choir has made a niche in making professional recordings for specialist markets, including museums, art galleries, and national libraries. Their first recording with the new early music label Obsidian, Thomas Tomkins 'These Distracted Times', was awarded Editor's Choice and CD of the Month in the Gramophone, and they have since gone on to record and tour a number of innovative programmes. The Choir's disc of sacred music by contemporary Roman composer, Claudio Dall'Albero, 'Polyphonia in Excelsis' (Resonus Classics) received glowing reviews upon its release in 2017: "David Skinner leads his young singers skilfully through these testing yet pleasing pieces that are both refreshingly new and comfortingly familiar." (The Observer)

Dr David Skinner - Director of Music, Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge

David Skinner divides his time equally as a scholar and choral director. An engaging presenter he has worked extensively for BBC radio, appearing in and writing a variety of shows on Radio 3 and 4. He acted as music advisor for the Music and Monarchy series on BBC 2 with David Starkey, and was Music Consultant for the BBC4 documentary Evensong with Lucy Worsley.

He has published widely on music and musicians of early Tudor England, and his latest publications include an historical introduction for a facsimile publication of Royal College of Music, MS 1070 – The Anne Boleyn Music Book – as well as a collected edition of Tallis's Latin church music for Early English Church Music (Stainer & Bell).

David is Fellow and Osborn Director of Music at Sidney Sussex College in the University of Cambridge where he teaches historical and practical topics from the medieval and renaissance periods. He directs the Choir of Sidney Sussex College, with whom he has toured and made highly acclaimed recordings, and is frequently invited to lecture, lead workshops and coach choirs throughout Europe and the USA.

Dr Peter Low - Founder & Choral Director, Cathedral Choir of the Risen Christ

Since 1956, Peter has served the Catholic Church as a chorister and from 1970 as Founder Director of the Risen Christ Choir which he currently directs at the Cathedral of the Good Shepherd. Now 71, Peter was conferred the National Youth Service Award at the Istana (1979) for his significant contributions to the promotion of Choral Music Excellence in Singapore. He was awarded a full Singapore government scholarship to study Choral Conducting at the Royal Academy of Music (London). In 1996, Peter received the Bene Merenti Award from the Vatican in recognition of his services to the Catholic Church. COMPASS (Composers and Authors Society of Singapore) acknowledged his outstanding contributions in the field of music with the Meritorious Award in 2018. He was elected Associate of the Royal Academy of Music (ARAM) by the Governing body of the Academy this year.

For his numerous efforts at fund raising for charitable causes and promoting international goodwill through choral concerts since 1973 he was made a Knight Commander with Star of the Order of St. Gregory by Pope John Paul II in 2003. Similarly, Italy conferred the Ufficiale della Ordine Stella d'Italia in 2014. Peter renders his services pro bono.

He is the Executive Director of his company which has provided services in the areas of Strategic Planning, Creativity and Innovation since 1992.

Alphonsus Chern (The Singapore Combined Church Choir)

Alphonsus began his journey as a church musician at the age of ten at a parish in Toa Payoh. He joined the Risen Christ Choir in 1991 under Dr Peter Low, and became organist at the Cathedral of the Good Shepherd in 2002, where he now plays three services every weekend. He works as a photojournalist with The Straits Times while continuing to serve in the 2nd People's Defence Force, directing the Cathedral Choir of St Gregory the Great and the Cathedral Organ Scholar Programme, and maintaining a fleet of nearly a hundred church organs in Singapore and the region.

Lim Chin Kai (Postlude)

Lim Chin Kai is the music director of St Andrew's Cathedral since 1992. He also teaches part-time at the Singapore Bible College and the National Institute of Education. He received his Bachelor in Church Music from Singapore Bible College and his Master of Music from University of Louisville, Kentucky, USA.

Hugh Rowlands - Senior Organ Scholar

Hugh Rowlands is the Senior Organ Scholar at Sidney. He began his musical training as a chorister at Westminster Abbey where he sang at numerous special services and state occasions, including the 2011 Royal Wedding and at St Peter's Basilica and the Sistine Chapel in Rome. He then went on to be a music and academic scholar at The King's School, Canterbury. During his gap year he was Organ Scholar at Royal Hospital Chelsea. He appears on two recordings as accompanist to Royal Hospital Choir of previously unrecorded choral works by Ralph Vaughan Williams on Albion and a recording of music for Remembrance on SOMM. He takes a keen interest in new music and has appeared with the London Contemporary Orchestra at London's Union Chapel, the Paris Philharmonie and London's Barbican Centre.

The Organisers
