





I THESSALONIANS HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

- * Book Title
 - * First of two letters written from Corinth ca. AD 5 I
- Author (1:1)Apostle Paul, Silvanus and Timothy
 - * Silvanus = Silas a key leader of Jerusalem church (Ac 15:22)

I THESSALONIANS HISTORICAL BACKGROUND


- Recipient (I:I)
 - Thessalonians Church at Thessalonica (modern: <u>Thessaloniki</u> aka Salonica in Greece)
 - * Conversion: Ac 17:1-4 (Paul's 2nd Missionary Journey)
 - Church Composition: Jews + Greeks (pagan background); mostly Gentiles (1:9)

* Recipient Setting


- * City was founded by Macedonian king Cassander, who named it after his wife Thessaloniki
- * Conquered by Romans in BC 168
- * Largest city in Macedonia, commercially important on the Via Egnatia;
- * Paganistic society, Greco-Roman culture



I THESSALONIANS HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

* Situation

The conversion of many Jews and Greek proselytes angered the unbelieving Jews to the extent that they incited a mob to attack the house of Jason, Paul's host. Not finding the missionaries, the mob dragged Jason and other believers to the magistrates who subsequently released them. Convinced of the danger to the missionaries, the Thessalonian believers sent Paul and Silas away by night to Berea (Ac 17:5-10a).



I THESSALONIANS PURPOSE

- * To remind and endorse the witness of the missionaries among them (I Thes I-3)
- * To affirm the Thessalonians' faith, and encourage them to excel in continuing testimony despite persecutions (4:1-12);
- * To comfort and render hope by instructing on the return of Jesus Christ (4:13-5:11).

I THESSALONIANS CONTENT

- * Exhortation to excel further in what the church is doing well
 - * Practice of love, encouragement, giving thanks, steadfast testimony
- * Key teachings on Eschatology (End-times / 2nd Coming):
 - * Rapture of the Church (4:13-18)
 - * Day of the Lord (5:2-11)
- * Other Themes
 - * Gospel Witness & Trials
 - Discipleship





- 2:9 \P You remember our labor and toil, brothers and sisters; \P
 - we worked night and day, ¶
 - → so that we might not burden any of you ¶
 - → while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God. ¶
- 2:10 You are witnesses, and God also, ¶
 - how pure, upright, and blameless our conduct was toward you believers.
- 2:11 As you know, we dealt with each one of you like a father with his children, ¶
 - → 2:12 urging ¶

2. Paul's Exhortations (4:1-5:28)

4:1 (ESV) Finally, then, brothers, we ask and urge you in the Lord Jesus,
that as you received from us how you ought to walk and to please God, just as you are doing, that you do so more and more.

2 For you know what instructions we gave you through the Lord Jesus.

2. Paul's Exhortations

2.1 Relationships & Lifestyle (4:1-12)

Three areas that the Thessalonians were taught, had continued to do well, and now Paul exhorts them to do so more and more:-

- * Sexual Purity (4:3-8)
- * Love other believers (4:9-10)
- * Diligence and live in peace (4:11-12)

2.2 The Rapture (4:13-18)

* Context: Church's concern over believers who had died before the Lord's Return (4:13)

"those who have fallen asleep" (e.g. ESV, NIV) ~ euphemism


2.2 The Rapture (4:13-18)

- * Definition: The term Rapture in Eschatology refers to the state or experience of being carried away or snatched away. It is derived from the Latin noun *raptus*.
- * The Latin verb rapio translates the verb in I Thes 4:17 $\alpha\rho\pi\alpha\zeta\omega$ harpazō meaning to "snatch away"; to be "caught up" or to be "taken by a force".
- * In Christian eschatology Rapture refers to the carrying away of believers (Church) from earth to heaven. In some theology books it is called the Translation of the Church. This topic is part of the larger topic on the 2nd coming of the Lord Jesus Christ.
- * Other verses: 2 Thes 2:1; I Cor 15:51 cf. Phil 2:21

2.2 The Rapture (4:13-18)

* Views: Real-Event vs. Not-Real-Event

* Real-Event: Differing views as to timing

2.2 The Rapture (4:13-18)

* Sequence of Events (4:16-17)

4:16 For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first.

4:17 Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air;

and so we will be with the Lord forever. (NRSV)

* 2.2 The Rapture (4:13-18)

- * Closely connected with the Parousia (parousiva) ~ coming of the Lord
- * The word parousia means 'coming' or 'presence'.
 In this short letter, Paul refers to the Lord's Coming in every chapter:-
 - * I Thes I:10 (ESV) ".... wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead, Jesus who delivers us from the wrath to come."
 - * I Thes 2:19 "For what is our hope or joy or crown of boasting before our Lord Jesus at his coming? Is it not you?"

- * I Thes 3:13 "... so that he may establish your hearts blameless in holiness before our God and Father, at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints."
- * I Thes 4:15 "For this we declare to you by a word from the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will not precede those who have fallen asleep."
- * I Thes 5:23 "Now may the God of peace himself sanctify you completely, and may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

2.3 The Day of the Lord (5:1-11)

- * This Day typically connotes God's special intervention in human history, whether past or future.
 - * It is an intervention that includes elements of terrifying judgment for the wicked or enemies of God, and/or mighty deliverance of the righteous.
- * In I Thess 5:1-11 Paul exhorts the Thessalonians to be alert and sober (5:6) in anticipation of the Day of the Lord (cf. notes in 2 Thess).
