New Year's Day is often a day of resetting hearts, making new commitments and renewing old ones. It's a day where one might also reassess the direction to go with regards to career or relationship. It's also a day where people look for a new start or a new beginning, especially if the previous year was a particularly disappointing one. What about you? What are your aspirations for the New Year?

For Cathedral – 2022 will be marked as a season of “returning to our first love.”

For some of us the very idea of throwing out an old calendar and starting on a new clean page is a poignant reminder that the new pages, like our lives can quickly become messy. Often the start of a New Year is a time of returning to our Lord

for a fresh start. Likewise, as we enter into the season of physical restoration, the Lord is also leading us into a season of spiritual restoration. Rather than just making a resolution to quit doing something or start doing something new, we will take the advantage of this spiritual impetus to face and deal with the deeper issues of our lives and return to our first love with Christ.
