
Temptation of Christ

Lent traditionally marks a season that begins with a focus on the temptation of Jesus. Of the three synoptic accounts, the gospel of Luke provides the most detail. Particularly, Luke emphaizes the role of the Holy Spirit at every stage of this event.

Luke 3:22

the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus at His baptism.

Luke 4:1,

Jesus, filled with the Holy Spirit, is then led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted or tested.

Luke 4:14,

having been tested, Jesus returns in the power of the Spirit.

As far as Luke was concerned, none of this was accidental or a result of the enemy's doing. Rather, every step, including the temptation and testing, was part of the Holy Spirit inspired plan of God for Jesus.

If so, what was the purpose? Why did Jesus need to be tempted or tested?

One possibility is that, just as with His baptism (Matthew 3:15), Jesus went through testing to fully identify with our struggle against sin.

At the heart of our never-ending struggle against sin lies a crucial question - to whom will we ultimately submit? Throughout His testing, Jesus constantly turned to Scripture demonstrating full submission to God's will – choosing obedience over saving himself, comfort or personal gain.

The devil's invitation to Jesus was for Him to do something for Himself - whether for physical needs, personal glory, or a sense of security in God.

Yet, with each temptation, Jesus refused to put his own needs or fears above God's will as revealed in Scripture. This was not the only time Jesus was tempted. Luke 4:13 tells us that the devil will test Jesus again when the opportunity comes.

We, too, are no strangers to temptation. When tested, we can see it as an opportunity to submit to God's will, above every other legitimate or illegitimate claim.

The test is not about which claim is justified, but about our willingness to put God above all else in life. Knowing myself, I realize that victory in this battle is only possible through the transformation the Holy Spirit brings to my life.

Reflection Questions

- What temptations or testings are you facing presently?
- What choices do these issues ultimately boil down to?
- What are you asking the Holy Spirit to help you with in your testing?

Lord, help me pray "not my will but Thine be done." In my moments of weakness and stumbling, Spirit grant me grace. Be my light and my guide. Amen.

Deanery of Cambodia
