

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What motivates missions?

It is simply knowing that it is God's desire for all people to be saved (1 Timothy 2:4).

This desire is God's missionary heart - theologically it is called **MISSIO DEI** which translates to the "mission of God" or the "sending of God". Missio Dei is the belief that mission is the very character and the very heart of God's very self. The task of mission originates from God's being and is communicated from His heart to ours and we respond.

Missions at home begin right where live, families, among neighbours, we our communities. workplaces, and While global missions take the gospel to distant places, local missions remind us that God has also placed us here, in this moment, for a purpose. Every conversation, act of service, and moment of compassion becomes an opportunity to reflect Christ's love to those around us. As we engage in outreach at home, we seek to meet real needs, build genuine relationships, and share the hope of Jesus in our everyday environments.





Adopt-a-Block-in-the-Community (ABC) is a community outreach of St Andrew's Cathedral, and a long-term commitment to minister to the residents living in Bukit Merah, where many are low-income individuals, families and elderly.

Volunteers engage the residents through various activities; befriending them through monthly visits and specially organised outings throughout the year, showing care through the distribution of food packs, small gifts and acts of kindness.

As many of the residents are elderly and staying at home, they need a listening ear or someone to talk to, or help with simple chores, such as reading letters and changing light bulbs.

Project Khmer H.O.P.E. (PKH) was established by the Cathedral in 2000 to address the social and economic needs of Cambodia's poor, helping vulnerable communities break out of the poverty cycle while sharing the hope of locus Christ

while sharing the hope of Jesus Christ.

OVERSEAS

Today, PKH serves around 500 youth and children through its three centres and an English school, providing residential vocational training for young people and educational support for children who cannot afford schooling.



A key focus of the ministry is the Suoy community, an Unreached People Group. Through education, meals, English lessons, and Bible teaching, PKH has opened doors for many Suoy villagers to encounter God's love in tangible ways.

PKH's vocational programs equip Cambodian youth with practical skills, such as English, hospitality, and industrial training, empowering them to secure stable employment in the service sector. Beyond skills training, PKH offers pastoral care and mentors students to serve their communities through acts of practical help, fostering a cycle of transformation and hope.

BATAM

Cathedral ministers to the community in the slums of Batam through the 289 Fellowship of the Manger (289 FOTM) ministry which started in 2009, with a children's ministry and food distribution for the poor. Since then, the ministry has grown steadily, serving the community

The name 289 Fellowship of the Manger is inspired by

through food pack distributions, children's programmes, home visitations, and the implementation of a clean water project in several villages.

Starting in 2025, the Cathedral introduced a different track, with a more intentional discipleship and leadership formation programme, particularly within our deanery churches. In collaboration with the Deanery of Indonesia, we aim to encourage spiritual growth and support the development of Batam's Anglican congregations toward full parish status. Additional initiatives include strengthening church ministries, expanding outreach to the Chinese-Hokkien community, and establishing a children and youth development and education centre.

My journey in the Mission Ministry began with a deep sense of calling from the Lord. As I waited upon Him, God made His direction clearer. In 2013, this path led me to join the 289 FOTM team - a decision that has shaped my walk with Christ in profound ways.

Serving the families in Batam has been both a privilege and a blessing. Our purpose is simple yet powerful: to bring hope to the families within our cluster churches and to remind them that they are not forgotten.

It is deeply heartening to see these families grow in their faith, participate in cell and women's groups, and even give back to their own communities and churches. Their resilience and devotion continually inspire me.

Some of my most memorable moments come from journeying alongside these families through the years - celebrating their milestones, witnessing their progress, and watching their children grow. Many who were once little ones are now youths or working adults. This reminds me of the importance of praying consistently for the next generation as they navigate new challenges and opportunities.

I often encourage church members to join our day trips. For those who have never been on a mission trip, this is a meaningful and accessible first step.

A typical day includes visiting families identified by our mission partners in Batam, sharing Scripture, praying with them, delivering provisions, and assisting with the Children's Ministry. These trips also offer valuable insight into the work of our cluster churches, their role in the community, and their ongoing needs.

Through every encounter and every visit, one truth remains steadfast in my heart: God is our promise-keeper and the light in our darkness. He makes a way even in the most difficult circumstances. This is the message of hope I pray each family and child we minister to will embrace - that God sees them, loves them, and will never leave them.

WEST NEPAL

The Anglican Church in Nepal (ACN) is a thriving indigenous movement, with more than 227 distinct indigenous groups. Despite the pressures and challenges Christians often face in Nepal - ranging from social resistance to restrictions on evangelism - the church continues to stand firm, demonstrating remarkable resilience, faith and unity.

Most Nepali Christians worship and fellowship in locally led networks. While most missions have focused on work in East Nepal, Cathedral has stepped into West Nepal - the country's least explored region, least reached and least resourced - to support the local churches and strengthen their ministry and encourage isolated believers.

Moving forward, SAC is actively partnering ACN by providing leadership and discipleship training, as well as programmes that invest in families, youth and children in Western Nepal. Through these efforts, we hope to build strong foundations for churches that can grow, multiply, and sustain themselves.

By engaging in these initiatives, we seek to equip local leaders, nurture the next generation, and support the continued expansion of the gospel in regions where the church is still young and developing.

When large-scale, violent protests in Nepal resulted in political instability and the closure of Kathmandu airport in September, we were uncertain if our mission trip to west Nepal could proceed. Thanks to God's intervention, however, just three weeks later, things settled down and we could enter the country as planned.

Apart from visiting cell groups and home churches to encourage them, we ran children's and youth programmes that drew some 650 people, more than expected. This showed us that when God opens a door, no man or circumstance can close it.



THAILAND MAESOT

MaeSot, a city in western Thailand that shares a border with Myanmar to the West, is a unique crossroads where cultures, challenges, and opportunities intersect. It is known for its substantial population of Burmese migrants, displaced families fleeing conflict and vulnerable border communities facing economic hardship, and has become a significant mission field where the church is uniquely positioned to bring hope, stability and transformation.

Cathedral partners the local church, St Stephen's Church, in MaeSot to meet physical needs, nurture spiritual growth, and strengthen families and communities. This partnership includes a wide range of initiatives such as children's ministries for migrant and refugee children, discipleship and leadership training, healthcare for those with limited access to medical care and support for the displaced and poor.

The ministry in MaeSot opens doors for Cathedral members to serve through teaching, mentoring youth and young adults, supporting children's programmes, assisting with administrative and logistical needs, offering prayer ministry, or participating in outreach and visitation.

Our mission seeks to bring these efforts together with a unified vision. Whether it is a remote village overseas, an underserved community in our own city, or a crisis-affected area in need of urgent support, medical missions give us the privilege of demonstrating Christ's compassion through skilled, tangible care.

Everyone can be involved, not only medical and dental professionals. Doctors and nurses can provide direct care and training: non-medical volunteers help with can registration, education, and prayer; others can support through giving, planning, providing supplies and other areas.

By combining excellent healthcare with genuine love, we reflect the ministry of Jesus, who healed the sick while reaching the heart.

KOABIKE SOK CHIN and **FAMILY**

Koabike Sok Chin (née Lim), who has a long association with the Cathedral, is a missionary who serves with the Summer Institute of Linguistics (SIL), Togo and Benin of West Africa, a sister organization of Wycliffe Bible Translators, in reaching Africans for Christ. She left Singapore in 1987, doing French studies in France before arriving in West Africa's Togo in 1989, where she joined a Moba language team to do translation, literacy and Scripture promotion work.

In 1992, the team began translating the New Testament into Moba. The work was completed in March 2008, when the Moba New Testament was printed, sold out and reprinted. By that time, Sok Chin had married Togolese Joseph Koabike, the main translator in 1995. Asked to take up other responsibilities after the project, the couple have been serving together as training consultants in Togo and Benin. Their son, David, started Secondary Three this year.

Just this year, Sok Chin has helped three language teams prepare the book printing of eight Biblical books so that their language communities can begin to see the fruits of the Bible translation in their own languages. Joseph continues to travel to different villages doing Bible translation checks and training translators. At the same time, he is working on research and writing his second book on Moba culture and religion.

SUSAN GOH

Susan has been serving as a missionary in Cambodia with Project Khmer H.O.P.E. (PKH) for 20 years as the Centre Director and Hospitality Trainer at PKH.

Before her work with PKH, Susan was with Singapore Airlines for 15 years and was also with Goodwood Park Hotel and a trainer for Sempati Air. She became a Christian in 2001, which was a turning point in her life leading to her long-term mission in Cambodia.

Her background as a cabin crew and trainer, have been instrumental in setting up the Hospitality vocational training course in PKH, where she trains poor young Cambodians and prepares them for jobs in Hotels and the Food & Beverage industries.

Deeply motivated by seeing transformation, not just in terms of job skills, but personal growth, spiritual faith and stronger communities, Susan, together with the team at PKH, mentors the young Cambodians through their training in PKH, and beyond, with many referring to Susan as 'Mum'.

Susan is also mentoring two former PKH graduates who have worked in the hotels, and are now on staff at PKH, to become the next hospitality trainers, to continue the work.

- For more of God's grace, more of God's patience, good health, as well as joy.
- That I will be able to pass on this good work to the next servant of God to carry on with this great team of staff for PKH.







Joyce was a staff member with St Andrew's Cathedral, serving with the Filipino Ministry for 20 years, before she responded to the call to serve as a missionary in Cambodia, with Project Khmer H.O.P.E. (PKH), as an English Teacher.

Since 2019, Joyce has been teaching the poor youth in Cambodia who have enrolled in the residential hospitality vocational training program at PKH, many who have very little understanding of the English language.

Aside from the English language, Joyce leads the students in devotions, and lends a listening ear to students who go through difficult life situations, providing pastoral support to them. Her work in Cambodia has guided young Cambodians to discover who Jesus is.

HEIDI LI



Heidi is a missionary serving in West Timor, Indonesia. Heidi is part of the team at St Andrew's School Kuatnana, a Christian school offering a full education pathway from Kindergarten all the way through Primary, Secondary, and High School, where she is leading the effort to establish a nursing and caregiver training course.

Heidi's path to missions began years earlier during her career as a nurse and later as a nursing lecturer in Singapore. Though she loved her work, she sensed a growing desire to use nursing not only to teach skills, but to touch lives in both physical and spiritual ways. That desire deepened during a mission trip to Cambodia, where she saw how healthcare could open doors for the Gospel and strengthen communities. It was there she first heard God's quiet but persistent call: "Will you go?"

Answering that call was not easy. Heidi wrestled with the fears of leaving comfort and stability behind. But through prayer, she found peace in obedience. With faith and courage, she left her full-time teaching role, joined the Cathedral's Missions Department, and began preparing to serve wherever God would lead.


